UW Department of Sociology Application FAQs

The initial application process is centralized through the <u>UW Graduate School</u>. The Graduate School charges a fee of \$90 (USD) to apply. Unfortunately, applicants studying on F or J visas are not eligible for application fee waivers. Any questions regarding <u>Application Fee Waivers</u> and <u>International Applicant questions</u> should be directed to their department. To <u>contact UW</u> Graduate School, go HERE.

Department Requirements

Application open and close dates: Our application *opens each year on September 1* and *closes on December 1*. Admissions decisions are usually made by early March. Applicants placed on the admission wait list will be notified as their status changes, up to the April 15 acceptance deadline.

Application Questionnaire and materials: Instead of a statement of purpose, we ask applicants to answer questions about their academic and professional goals, and how their experiences have prepared them for graduate study in sociology. Here are the questions for the 2025 application cycle (for acceptance in our Fall 2026 cohort), each is limited to 3,000 characters):

- Describe your professional goals and how you envision studies at the University of Washington aiding in your progress toward those goals.
- What are your most important academic and/or professional qualities, and what do you hope to improve upon in your graduate studies?
- Describe any past or current involvement in research. What motivated this research, what was your role, and what did you learn in the process?
- Provide descriptions of two or more situations or activities in which you demonstrated persistence and/or the ability to overcome adversity.
- Provide a brief description of a situation or activity in which you demonstrated leadership and/or commitment to your community. This may include, but is not limited to, ways in which you have contributed to diversity, equity, and/or inclusion in your community, school, or workplace.
- Is there anything else you would like us to know?
- Do you have any additional funding (scholarships, fellowships, grants, etc.)?

Curriculum Vitae or Resume

Letters of Recommendation: We require 3 - 5 letters of recommendation. We suggest applicants request these letters in a timely manner, at least a month in advance of the deadline.

Writing Sample: Submit a 5 -15 page paper (double-spaced) that demonstrates your ability to clearly analyze and write about a social scientific topic. This can be an excerpt from a larger paper. The 15-page limit does not include title pages and references.

Unofficial Transcripts: Submit unofficial transcripts from <u>all previous institutions</u> of higher learning (colleges and universities).

GRE scores: At this time, we do not require a submission of a GRE score. This is subject to change.

Non-Native English Speakers: While the Sociology Department follows the guidance of the UW Graduate School regarding the English Language Proficiency (ELP) Requirement and the appointment of non-native English-speaking Teaching Assistants (TAs), for our program, you must submit a passing language proficiency test if you are a non-native speaker or your application will not move forward. The reason for this is because our main source of funding is TA appointments and graduate students interact with undergraduate students on a regular basis and must have proven language skills prior to entering the program. UW Sociology is a research-focused department. Our faculty specialize in theory driven, empirical research in a wide range of social topics. Current research strengths include demography and health, criminology, law and deviance, analysis of states, markets and societies (which includes comparative historical sociology, economic sociology, social movements, ethnic conflict and the sociology of religion), social inequality, migration studies, and research design, statistical analysis and data-intensive social science.
